I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. On 5-13 May 2010, the Asian Development Bank (ADB) fielded a Midterm Review Mission¹ to Viet Nam to review the implementation of Loan No. 2283-VIE (SF): Agriculture Science and Technology Project (The Project). To assess whether the Project's planned outputs can be delivered and the intended outcome can be achieved, the Mission conducted comprehensive discussions with the Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development (MARD)—the Executing Agency (EA) of the Project—its International Cooperation Department and Central Project Management Unit (CPMU), Department of Finance, Department of Organization and Personnel (DOP), Department of Science, Technology and Environment (DSTE), Ministry of Finance, National Agricultural and Fishery Extension Center (NAFEC), Institute Project Management Units(IPMUs) including Secondary Technical School for Food & Food Stuff, Forest Science Research Institute, Plant Protection Research Institute, Soil & Fertilizer Research Institute), and Provincial Project Management Unit(PPMU) in Thanh Hoa Province. The Mission visited research project on rice-fish-duck integrated system and extension demonstration models carried out by service providers on pig, livestock and porcupine raising in poor households.
- 2. The Mission (i) reviewed project implementation issues, and remedial measures needed, of the four components based on the assumptions and risks in the design and monitoring framework; (ii) followed up on the implementation of the research programs towards a pro-poor, market-oriented approach and their linkage to extension activities; (iii) reviewed the progress of extension demonstrations, the extension materials developed, methodology applied, and effectiveness of the service providers; (iv) reviewed baseline information and monitoring system developed for the research, extension, and training activities; (v) discussed the availability and timely allocation of counterpart funding; (vii) discussed the proposed reallocation of loan proceeds and loan extension; (viii) reviewed contracts awards and disbursement achievements for 2010; (ix) followed up on the submission of draft bidding documents for the procurement of small-scale civil works and goods of remaining research institutes and schools; and (x) reviewed the Borrower's compliance with the loan covenants.
- 3. The Mission was concluded with a wrap-up meeting on 13 May 2010 in Hanoi, chaired by Dr. Bui Ba Bong, Vice Minister of MARD, and attended by staff of MARD and representatives of other government agencies/organizations/stakeholders. A list of persons met and those present at the wrap-up meeting is shown in Appendix 1.
- 4. This Aide Memoire records the findings of the Mission, and agreements reached between representatives of the Government and the Mission. Agreements reflected herein are subject to approval by higher authorities of the Government and ADB. The Government's confirmation of the Aide Memoire is requested by 30 May 2010.

The Mission comprised of Sununtar Setboonsarng (Mission Leader), Agustina Musa (Financial Due Diligence Specialist) for 3 days, and Ma. Dolores Tejada (Associate Project Analyst).

II. BACKGROUND

- 5. ADB approved the Loan on 11 December 2006 for SDR 20.198 million (US\$30 million equivalent) from ADB's Special Funds resources. The Loan Agreement became effective on 13 June 2007 with a loan closing date of 30 June 2012. The last loan review mission was fielded in September 2009.
- 6. The Project aims to strengthen the national agriculture science and technology (AST) system in Viet Nam, thereby contributing to the sustainable and equitable growth of the agriculture sector and ultimately to reduced rural poverty. The Project addresses critical issues involved in AST development, including the low level of linkages among key AST areas (agricultural research, extension, and training), and the gap in the capacity of physical and human resources for the national AST system. The Project contributes to the resolution of these issues and increase the effectiveness and relevance of AST activities for clients to receive benefits of improved AST, and promote on-farm and off-farm sustainable use of natural resources. Inclusion of the three key AST areas under the Project as part of the integrated national system is vital if the full potential of AST development is to be realized. The Project has four components namely (i) client-oriented agricultural research and capacity strengthening, (ii) grassroots agricultural extension improvement, (iii) rural-based technical and vocational training, and (iv) project management.

III. REVIEW OF PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION

A. Overall Progress

- As of 30 April 2010, the overall progress of the Project is estimated at 43% against the elapsed time of 61% since loan approval (see Appendix 2). It should be noted that since its inception, the Project has been hampered by (i) a delay in consultant recruitment, (ii) slow start-up, (iii) delay in allocation of counterpart fund, (iv) slow process of approval of IPMUs and PPMU investment plans, and (v) weak capacity of IPMUs, PPMUs, and the CPMU. Despite the difficulties faced during the first 1.5 years of the project, significant progress has been noted since the last quarter of 2009. Investment plans, procurement plans, as well as research and extension plans are ongoing and disbursements are picking up rapidly.
- 8. With exponential increase in project activities in all components, the challenge of effectively monitoring these project activities is substantial. As has been expressed in previous missions, the Project needs a coherent vision of a pro-poor and pro-climate change development strategy to guide and link activities in all project components. With a shared vision and a clear monitoring framework being in place and understood by all project team members at central and provincial levels, the synergism among project activities are expected to be enhanced. Effective technical inputs from consultants continue to be a challenge in assuring quality of project activities.

B. Progress of Project Implementation

9. The Mission reviewed the progress under each of the project components and discussed the timetable for planning and implementation of various activities for the remainder of the Project. A revised implementation schedule is attached in Appendix 3.

1. Client-Oriented Agricultural Research and Capacity Strengthening

- 10. Client-Oriented Research Programs. The Project promotes agricultural research programs and timely application of research results to clients' practical uses. Research proposals focusing on knowledge, information, and technologies relevant to the agro ecological regions serviced by regional research institutes are funded under the Project. DSTE continues to oversee activities under this sub-component.
- 11. A total of 125 research programs are ongoing with 93 programs (74.4%) are being implemented in remote and upland areas of central, north and western Viet Nam. In 2009 disbursements were \$1,267,000 accounting or 94.7% of the plan in 2009. In 2010, 31 research projects have received 70% advance payment of total research funds but some researchers are facing delays in receiving project funds by at least five months. To date, 7 research programs are delayed due to floods, droughts, and problems in chemicals procurement.
- 12. Of the 125 research projects, 58 or 46% are related to environmental protection. Of the 58 projects, 21 are on biodiversity, 16 on climate change adaptation; 8 on Integrated Pest Management (IPM); 7 organic and bio-fertilizers and 6 on food safety and VIETGAP. The Mission reiterates concerns on remaining 54% of the research projects which focus largely on agriculture intensifications and introductions of new species to indigenous people and ecosystems of upland areas. The Mission recommends that ADB social and environmental safeguards, and indigenous people policy be made available to all project researchers. Further actions on CPMU and DSTE is also required to ensure that the research program can produce short-term results at a relatively low cost to be easily extended to poor farmers.
- 13. Since last review mission, training courses on research management, implementation, and use of the monitoring and evaluation system developed by the Project have been conducted (in Hue, Nghe An, and Ninh Thuan provinces) for 170 people, including leaders of research institutes and 120 researchers. Three training courses were conducted for project researchers to improve project design to ensure social and environmental safeguards. As a result of the training, two research projects modified project designs to focus on climate change. M& E system for research projects is in place but increased attention is required on the part of CPMU and DSTE to effectively implement the monitoring system. The Mission recommends that CPMU assign specific staff to monitor progress of research projects.
- 14. **Training of Research Staff.** The subcomponent addresses the shortage of qualified research staff by providing on-the-job training and postgraduate and postdoctoral study programs for the staff of agricultural research institutes and other institutions of the national AST system. The on-the-job trainings will enable staff to effectively utilize the existing and proposed laboratory equipment and facilities, and improve staff knowledge and skills to manage sophisticated facilities. DOP continues to oversee activities under this sub-component. The Mission endorse DOP's request for 2 overseas short-term training on food safety, climate change adaptation and biotechnology.
- Overseas Training. Of the 55 students envisioned to study overseas, a total of 59 have been identified after 4 rounds of selection, however, 8 (mostly female) have withdrawn due to family reasons. Forty one person or 74.5% have already gone overseas. These include 3 Post Doc, 18 PhD, 20 Masters 6 to the United States, 15 to Australia, 6 to Germany, 3 to Netherlands, 3 to Japan, 3 to Thailand, 1 to Denmark, 2 to England, 1 to India, and 1 to Sweden. About 20% of participants are women. Delays in enrollment are

due largely to weakness in English language. Workshops have been organized by the Project to facilitate application process and to improve English skills.

Sixteen qualified candidates are selected for the remaining 14 slots. Given the remaining time of the Project, it was agreed to select students for masters degree (12) and post doctoral program (2). As much as possible, students under the Project are to focus their study programs on new emerging issues such as agriculture and environment, climate-friendly agriculture, forestry, and natural resource management, food safety, biomass management, etc.

Under the current schedule, 6 PhD candidates will complete the studies in April 2013 and 10 candidates including 8 PhD candidates and 2 Master candidates will complete their study courses in November 2012. So as of this moment 16 of the 41 students will complete their program after the current project closing date, The EA, in consultation with supervising government agencies, proposed that the loan be extended by 1 year to finance the students to complete their studies. It is proposed that the new physical completion be extended on 31 December 2012 and financial closing on 30 June 2013.

(ii) Local Training. To date, a total of 29 training courses were conducted for 667 research staff of which 43% were women. In 2009, 18 eighteen training courses were conducted by the Viet Nam Academy of Agricultural Science to strengthen the capacity of research staff in the ten research institutes. The Project has developed M&E framework for training courses consisting of three levels: (i) end of training course; (ii) six to 12 months after the course; and (iii) one year after the course. However, only the first level of evaluation has been implemented. Based on evaluation at first level, 90% of the training courses on scientific research management and research plan-making processes met their needs and 70% of trainees indicated that they could apply the skills in their jobs. Eighty-seven percent of trainees ranked the outcomes of the courses at high and medium quality.

The Mission noted that training topics are very diverse and courses which are not core competent of VAAS such as macroeconomic modeling did not receive good evaluation so should be discontinued. The Mission recommends that training courses be centered on sustainable and equitable agriculture development which is the overall objective of the Project. In particular, training courses on climate change mitigation and adaptation for the poor, including the use of ICT in agriculture be increased during the second half of the Project.

- 15. **Upgrading of Research and Laboratory Equipment.** The Project is providing and upgrading essential research and laboratory equipment of selected MARD agricultural research institutes to fill critical gaps in research due to outdated equipment. DSTE continues to oversee activities under this sub-component. The Mission endorse DSTE's request to carry out training on technical English and use of high-tech laboratory equipment.
- 16. 17 procurement packages (comprising 14 contracts) out of 31 (including ASINCV) have been awarded with a disbursement of \$637,844. The installation and necessary trainings are expected to be completed in 3Q 2010. A summary of the status of the procurement of packages

can be found in Appendix 4. Of the total 31 procurement packages planned, 17 packages have been awarded and 26 bidding procedures are ongoing.

17. The Mission inspected equipments in three participating research institutes and one school. It was found that capacity of research institute to utilize and maintain the equipment are satisfactory. Nine training courses on the use of equipment and laboratory management have been conducted with 193 participants (52% women). Awareness on proper disposal of chemical wastes from experiments has increased in the participating research institutes. The Mission recommends that the Project's environment expert develop a check list and guide CPMU to conduct spot checks on waste treatments from laboratory of participating research institute and record the results in project report.

2. Grassroots Agricultural Extension Improvement

- 18. The Project is improving farmers' access to participatory and pro-poor extension services, and is strengthening linkages between agricultural research and extension services. Activities are being implemented in Dak Nong, Nghe An, Ninh Thuan, Quang Nam, and Thanh Hoa provinces. NAFEC continues to oversee activities under this component.
- 19. **Pro-poor Provincial Agricultural Extension Services.** This sub-component provides (i) ongoing technical training programs for local extension staff and farmer groups, and (ii) procurement of basic equipment and provision of support for incremental costs of the information and communication capacity and networks of NAFEC, provincial agriculture extension centers, and district stations for agricultural extension.
- 20. Extension activities are on-going in all five provinces. Implementation progress of the provinces of Thanh Hoa and Nghe An are on track. Progress in Dak Nong has improved but is still behind schedule. The Mission recommends that CPMU provides intensive supervision to ensure timely implementation in Dak Nong. The Mission recommends a strategy to engage private sector firms to develop nitch products from this province.
- 21. A total of 45 extension staff from five provinces have undergone Training of Trainer (TOT). A total of 386 training courses were conducted for 9,676 extension personel. 39 courses for 1,007 provincial and district extension workers, 45 courses for 1224 extension service providers, 302 courses for 7.445 rural-based extension workers. So far, there has been no systematic evaluation of the training of extension personnel. The Mission requests that evaluation be conducted and the report of evaluation of training be included in the quarterly report to be submitted to ADB.
 - 22. The Mission recommends that training on market-linkages for the poor, environmental and social implications of extension programs be further enhanced. The Mission also recommends that CPMU conduct a study to identify and translate pro-poor and pro-climate change agriculture extension and training materials developed under ADB TAs and other development partners to be distributed to all PPMUs.
 - 23. Networks of exchange for extension workers has been established through an overseas study tour to Thailand and 6 in-country visits organized by 5 provinces—Thanh Hoa (2), Ninh Thuan (2), Dak Nong (1) and Nghe An (2) –for staff of PPMU, extension centers, and extension service agencies totaling 101 people. Training courses were conducted for 197 participants

(44.2% female) agricultural extension staff at national and provincial levels to strengthen communication capacity.

- 24. CPMU and NAFEC are designing a pilot program using mass media in five provinces to disseminate information on subjects related to sustainable and equitable agriculture development. The program has been delayed due issues related to administrative procedures related to competitive bidding with TV stations. With the issues recently resolved, the progress of activities and the equipment purchase is expected to improve. The Mission recommends the following for the pilot projects:
 - 1. International consultants (extension and environment experts) be involved in the design and implementation of the program, in particular, in reviewing the contents, scripts of the DVD, and quality of production of various information packages.
 - 2. The contents of the information packages are to focus on promotion of safe food production, climate change mitigation, and climate change adaptation by the poor. At least one DVD be developed on opportunities for farmers to receive carbon credit from compost and biochar production.
 - 3. In addition to TV, radio, and website, the use of mobile phone and other ICT in pro-poor extension be included as one of the information dissemination means.
- 25. NAFEC in collaboration with PPMUs have conducted survey on indigenous knowledge in some project provinces in 2008-2009. The Mission noted that the survey results have not been properly utilized in the project activities. The Mission recommends that project consultants assist PPMU to process survey data and work with NAFEC to utilize information in the survey to enhance project activities.
- 26. **Promotion of Extension Contracts.** The sub-component finances on-farm demonstration trials in the provinces through contractual arrangements with regional or national research institutes to strengthen the provincial links between research and extension.
- 27. To date, the five provinces have awarded a total of 272 agriculture extension contracts, comprising 16 pilot models and 256 demonstration models, valued at about \$2.17 million. About 120 demonstrations (44%) are carried out in upland areas with 47% of project beneficiaries being women. Participatory method has been effectively adopted in identifying the needs of the poor and the appropriate households to carry out the demonstrations. Farmers visited by the Mission have benefited significantly from the project and are actively extending their newly acquired knowledge to other poor farmers in the same commune. The Mission recommends that CPMU explore the possibility of engaging these early beneficiaries as commune extension workers under service providers using participatory selection method.
- 28. The problem of lack of service providers to submit bids for extension contract at the start of the Project has declined with the implementation of Government Decree No. 115. Nevertheless, insufficient number of service providers to submit bids is still a problem in remote mountainous districts. The Mission recommends increasing private sector involvement in developing indigenous products for niche market in the mountainous provinces.
- 29. A review of service providers shows that a variety of extension service providers have been participating in the bidding process. These include district agricultural extension stations, semi-public service agencies, social organizations such as farmer's union and gardening association, seed company, fertilizer company, and research institutes. It appears that agricultural extension stations and technical general service centers at district level are the only ones participating in remote areas.

- 30. Since the use of extension contract in Viet Nam is pioneered under the Project, the Mission recommends that a study be conducted in Q3 of 2010 to evaluate effectiveness of extension contract to extract lessons for MARD and for improving project implementation. In particular, the fact that district extension stations are participating as service providers should be seriously scrutinized.
- 31. During field visits to livestock demonstration under the Project, the Mission noted that extension materials produced under the Project could be improved to be more pro-poor, including adding more illustrations and pictures for poor farmers with limited literacy. The Mission also noted environmental safeguards of the livestock projects are not being implemented.
- 32. The Mission reiterated the recommendations provided in the March 2009 Mission and added the following recommendations:
 - Where feasible, contract farming schemes of safe food and environmentally friendly products (such as organic products) is to be promoted. Study tours for farmer leaders and TOT be organized to visit schemes organized by the Metro Supermarket and box schemes or organic vegetables organized by NGOs and social entreprenures in different locations in the country.
 - (ii) Extension program for poor households is to adopt a holistic approach of empowering the households and not focusing only on yield improvement without consideration on market linkage. Other production-related issues such as i.e., processing, packaging, or marketing should be considered. For indigenous communities, production of high-value products for niche market is to be prioritized.
 - (iii) Where demonstration demonstration plots are set up, letters of invitation to households to visit the demonstration plot should be addressed to the women at least once in the three formal visits under the Project. This will ensure that women will also benefit from the project activities.
 - (iv) Additional training be conducted for extension workers and service providers on (i) gender mainstreaming, (ii) participatory method, (iii) climate change, environment, social, and health implications of agriculture technologies.
 - (v) In all project activities, social and environmental safeguards are to be strictly implemented. Gender action plan are to be reflected in all activities under the Project.
 - (vi) The system of information dissimination to farmers through ICT technologies in particular through mobile phone (SMS) be explored for the project. NAFEC and CPMU are to review experiences of using SMS to send information to farmers and assess the feasibility of introducing into the Project.

3. Rural-Based Technical and Vocational Training

33. The capacity of ten rural-based technical and vocational training schools is being strengthened by (i) improving technical knowledge, teaching, and managerial skills of teachers and administrators and curricula; and (ii) upgrading library and laboratory equipment and materials, teaching and laboratory facilities, and office equipment for school administration. DOP continues to oversee activities under this component.

- Workshops and seminars on development strategy for the 10 schools in the Project are being carried out. Course conducted include the following:
- (i) Three training courses on "Developing Training Curricula" for 70 participants, including 15 females (21.4%).
- (ii) Four training courses on credit transfer system for 120 participants, including 23 females
- (iii) three training courses on compiling training materials for 86 participants, including 28 females (32.5%).
- (iv) English training courses were organized at each of the 10 project schools for school leaders and teachers (15-20 participants in each schools).
- 35. Through these workshops, the 10 schools have been able to do the following:

(i) Prepared strategy development plans up to 2020,

- (ii) Prepared individual outlines on curriculum completion and training materials development (with detailed cost estimates),
- (iii) Established a steering board on curriculum completion and training materials development, and
- (iv) Prepared a training master plan to strengthen the capacity of each school in 2009.
- 36. Almost all schools have completed the survey on current curriculum and training needs and two schools have submitted training programs to DOP.
- 37. The weak linkages between schools and the private sector (i.e., agro-industries) and the limited awareness on new emerging issues related to agriculture and climate change remains the weak areas of the project. The Mission reiterated its concern on improving the coherence of activities and exchange among institutes and schools and strengthening collaboration with trade and agro-industry associations to ensure that training activities address the needs of the rapidly changing environment of the food industry. Climate change and food safety are to be integrated into curriculum and textbooks of participating schools. Completion of curriculum development to address these weaknesses will be concentrated for the remaining project period.
- 38. Contracts have been awarded for the procurement of (i) small-scale civil works for the construction and renovation of classrooms, libraries, and laboraties; and (ii) school & laboratory equipment for the 10 training and vocational schools. Draft bidding documents and bid evaluation reports for the remaining packages continue to be prepared and submitted for ADB approval. To date, 18 contracts (8 for civil works and 10 for equipment) have been awarded with a disbursement of \$675,633. The installation and necessary trainings are expected to be completed in 2010. A summary of the status of the procurement of packages is in Appendix 5.

4. Project Management

39. The CPMU is the overall project management support, acting as the central contact and coordination point for the Project, and monitoring the progress of all components. There are five provincial project management units (PPMU) in five provinces and 20 institute project management units (IPMU) comprising ten research institutes and ten agricultural colleges & vocational schools implementing the various project activities.

- 40. The following highlights the Mission's findings and recommendations:
 - (i) Slow Submissions of PPMUs and IPMUs. CPMU is to continue training PPMU and IPMU staff on preparation of financial documents to expedite project activities.
 - (ii) Collaboration Between Consultants and CPMU. Communication between consultants and CPMU has not been sufficiently improved, resulting in ineffective technical inputs of consultants into project activities. Past recommendations of the Mission to hold regular meetings between consultants and CPMU has not been implemented. Meeting logs and attendance sheets are to be sent to ADB regularly.
 - (iii) Rental of Office Space. The Mission was informed that the construction of the new building to host CPMU is delayed by 18 months and the Project is requested to shoulder the rental fee for CPMU until the new building is ready. MARD assured the Mission that rental fee for CPMU office will be covered by the Government. ADB loan proceed will be used only as a last resource, if necessary. The Mission requests that in the new rental agreement, sufficient office space be provided for consultants to improve communication between consultants and CPMU.
 - (iv) Monitoring and Evaluation Capacity. Monitoring framework for component 1 on research and training has been established but yet to be effectively implemented. Monitoring framework for component 2 and 3 are yet to be developed and implemented. The Mission recommends additional consultant services on M&E and database management to operationalize cohesive monitoring systems for each project components. Baseline information are to be consolidated into database by CPMU and monitoring systems are to be operationalized by Q3 of 2010. CPMU to allocate full-time staff to follow up with IPMUs and PPMUs on project reporting. Additional training on monitoring and evaluation are to be organized for staff in all project activities.
 - (v) Project Design and Monitoring Framework (DMF). The Mission and the Project team updated the DMF (Appendix 14) and revised the design summary and indicators to make them measurable and consistent with the information and data in the main text of the RRP, detailed cost estimates, and other supporting documents of the Project. There are no changes made in project scope and key investment activities. The CPMU will finalize the draft DMF and M&E and submit it for ADB comments by 30 June 2010.

To enhance project activities, the Mission, in consultation with CPMU agreed to conduct the following studies:

(i) Study on International Best Practices and Knowledge Projects on Pro-poor Agriculture Development. A local researcher (with background on pro-poor research/extension) will be engaged to review knowledge products developed by ADB and other development partners on pro-poor agriculture technologies and climate change adaptation for the poor. So far, the Project has not benefited from these knowledge products. The technologies will include not only production but also pre and post harvest handling, processing, and linkage to market. The researcher will identify the knowledge products, translate them, and recommend them for extension trials in Project areas. The researcher will work with CPMU to create an action plan and mechanisms to transfer these knowledge products to improve quality of activities in all PPMU and IPMUs. Documents to be reviewed will include but not limited to ADB RETA to

CGIAR centers on technologies in marginal land, RETA on GMS vegetable value chain, RETA on GMS transboundary disease control, FAO, IFOAM, etc.

- (ii) Evaluation of Service Provider. A study will be conducted to evaluate service providers under the Project to extract lessons for the Project and for MARD. The study will be conducted by international Extension Specialist using survey funds currently allocated under consultants contract.
- (iii) Mini-impact/ Cost-Benefit of Extension Study. In Q4 of 2010, an international researcher will be engaged to work with the Database/M&E specialist to conduct a study on cost-benefits and return to investment on extension activities of the Project. A survey of about 200 households in each province will be conducted in communes under the Project where extension demonstration has been implemented in 2009 to assess the immediate outcomes and impacts of current extension program.
- (iv) E-Library Action Plan Development. A study will be conducted to develop an action plan for e-library establishment for participating research institutes and schools under the Project.

C. Procurement of Civil Works, Goods and Services

- 41. An updated list of procurement status at schools and institutes provided by the CPMU is shown in Appendix 5 and 6, respectively. The status of procurement activities for each component in the project design is listed as follows:
 - (i) Component 1: Contracts have been awarded for the procurement of research and laboratory equipment while draft bidding documents and bid evaluation reports for the remaining packages continue to be prepared and submitted for ADB approval. To date, 20 contracts for equipment have been awarded. The installation and necessary trainings are expected to be completed in 3Q 2010.

(ii) Component 2: The procurement of office equipment for the PPMUs and extension equipment for agricultural extension at district level have been completed.

(iii) Component 3: Eight and ten contracts have been awarded for the procurement of small scale-civil works and equipment, respectively. Draft bidding documents and bid evaluation reports for the remaining packages are still being prepared to be submitted for ADB approval. The installation and necessary trainings are expected to be completed in 2010.

42. The Mission and EA revisited the Procurement Plan and made minor changes as seen in Appendix 7.

D. Consulting Services

43. Status of Consulting Firm Inputs. As of 30 April 2010, contracts awarded is \$1.090 million (100.8% of budget allocation) and disbursement is \$437,691 (40% of budget allocation). Of the 125 person-months of consulting services inputs (29 international and 96 national), a total of 68.91 person-months (14.93 international and 53.98 national) have been utilized as of 30 April 2010, equivalent to 55%. The schedule of consultants' inputs is presented in Appendix 8.

- 44. The project implementation consultants were fielded 13 months after Loan approval. Until mobilization of the consulting firm in September 2008, administrative and technical support were provided to the CPMU under TA 4619.² Due partly to this, the consulting firm initially faced difficulties in providing effective inputs. The need to hold regular weekly meetings between CPMU, implementing agencies, and the consultants was stressed to update each other on key project issues and outcomes.
- Ineffective technical inputs of international consultants has been a serious problem under the Project. Quality of project activities has suffered due to delays in mobilization of key consultants. To date, some project activities, in particular extension activities have not benefited from technical inputs on international best practices in pro-poor extension development. Monitoring and evaluation expert and extension expert were only mobilized in December 2009 while environmental expert is yet to be mobilized. In addition, international extension specialist was mobilized in Dec 2009 but resigned after only 0.5 months due to personal problem. The Mission met with representative of consulting firm to discuss the issues. The consulting firm agreed to expedite the consultant replacements and mobilizations taking into account the modified TOR to incorporate experts on Clean Development Mechanism(CDM) in agriculture, pro-poor ICT extension methodology, and linkages to private sector.
- 46. The Mission recommends the following for action of the CPMU:
- (i) International Extension Specialist. With the resignation of the current expert, recruit a new extension specialist and increase his/her input from current balance of 3.6 months to 12 months for remaining period of the Project. The TOR is to be modified to include skills related to ICT and extension, pro-poor extension material production, climate change adaptation/mitigation for the poor.
- (ii) International Environmental Specialist. Expert recruited could not be mobilized due to other commitments so new environment specialist is to be identified. The TOR is to be modified to include skills related to Clean Development Mechanism(CDM) opportunities in agriculture sector, including carbon credit for compost, environmental requirement for food safety certifications.
- (iii) National Database Management/M&E Specialist. A new national consultant is to be engaged intermittently for 10 months to create database for M&E system for each component of the Project and train staff of CPMU, PPMUs and IPMUs to operationalize the system. The expert will consolidate the baseline data, implement impact and evaluation studies under the Project.
- (iv) Value Chain Development Specialist. A new national consultant is to be engaged for 12 months to assist in strengthening linkages to private sector to identify products demanded by market which remote rural communities can produce and promote product development in the extension projects. Using the results of the indigenous knowledge survey of the Project, the researcher will work with private sector to identify indigenous products with market potential for urban and export markets. A niche market product development plan will be developed together with extension services and implemented in project areas. Participatory guarantee system will also be introduced in the project communes as part of product development. Experience in

contract farming of high-value products, including certified products for urban and export markets is required.

- (v) National Communication Specialist. The consultant will be engaged for 24 months to assist in improving quality of reporting and document production in the Project.
- 47. **Status of Individual Consultants.** As of 30 April 2010, the Project has engaged 7 national individual consultants (extension specialists for the 5 provinces, a training consultant, and a CPMU coordinator) for a total of 164 person-months input. To date, 112.5 person-months have been rendered.

E. Project Reporting

ADB received the mid-term review report a few days prior to the start of the Mission in early May 2010. The content of the report was more comprehensive than the past project report. The Mission reiterates the need for the Project to improve the quality of the report. The progress report should include attachments such as brief summary of the implementation progress of the research programs, update of the loan covenants, update of the action plan for all activities under each component, computation of overall implementation progress, and an update on the list of items procured. A list of reports submitted and publications under the Project is shown in Appendix 9.

F. Project Costs and Financing

- 49. **Contract Awards and Disbursement.** As of 30 April 2010, the CPMU reported total disbursement of VND228,290,129,000 (approximately \$12.95 million) comprising of VND 174,412,829,000 (approximately \$9.9 million) of ADB funds and VND53,877,300,000 (approximately \$3.05 million). A schedule showing overall project expenditure to date is in Appendix 10.
- 50. The status of ADB Loan utilization as of 30 April 2010 can be found in Appendix 11. As of 30 April 2010, the dollar-equivalent value of ADB's loan (SDR20.198 million) is \$30.501. The cumulative contract awards and disbursements of loan proceeds were \$8.47 million and \$8.965 million, respectively. The 2010 contract awards and disbursement projections are \$5.20 million and \$5.18 million and accomplishments as of 30 April 2010 were \$1.620 million (or 31%) and \$1,700 million (or 33%).
- 51. Audited Financial Statements. To aim for a timely submission (30 June 2010) of the audited report for 2009, the Mission reminded CPMU to request that the auditor commence auditing procedures as early as possible.
- 52. **Counterpart Funds.** Of the VND118.851 billion counterpart funding requirement reflected in the Project's projected expenditures for 2010, approximately VNS90.919 billion has been committed by the Central Government for expenditures covering Components 1, 3, and 4; while a total of approximately VND27.932 billion has been committed by the five participating provinces for activities in Component 2.
- 53. Counterpart funds from CPMU has been sufficient for project implementation but counterpart funds from PPMUs faced some difficulties. Counterpart funds allocation remains problematic in Ninh Thuan and Quang Nam Provinces. In 2010, the Project Steering

Committee authorized reallocation of project funds earmarked for these two provinces in 2009 to use in Thanh Hao and Nghe An, as these two provinces have more participating districts and have sufficient counterpart funds.

G. Benefit Monitoring and Evaluation

54. Benefit Monitoring and Evaluation System of the Project is yet to be fully operationalized and request by ADB for increased attention on this activities has not been sufficiently addressed. Database on baseline information at the start of the project on different project components remains scattered and urgent actions in compiling them is required.

H. Environmental and Social Safeguards

- 55. As the Project works largely in environmental and social sensitive areas, ADB safeguards should be strictly adhered to. Based on field visit during the Mission, awareness on social and environmental safeguards remains to be improved. The CPMU is to work on improving social and environmental requirements of research, extension and vocational training activities. The Mission reiterates that all project staff familiarize themselves with ADB's policies available at ADB website. Where documents are available in Vietnamese, such as the Project's gender action plan, as agreed between the Socialist Republic of Viet Nam and ADB, the CPMU is to make the documents available to all PPMU and IPMU staff.
- 56. The Mission recommends that where relevant and appropriate, training be conducted for project personnel including service providers:
 - (i) Gender mainstreaming
 - (ii) Participatory method of research and extension
 - (iii) Social and environmental safeguards, including biodiversity
 - (iv) Holistic approach to empowering poor farming households
 - (v) Working with indigenous people
 - (vi) Agri-food product certification system and contract farming of green products
 - (vii) Production of pro-poor extension materials
 - (viii) Agriculture and climate change
 - (ix) Baseline and M&E system

I. Compliance with Loan Covenants

57. The Mission finds the loan covenants to be generally complied with. Insufficient counterpart funds from two PPMU are being addressed by MARD. Weaknesses on gender, environment, and social safeguards are being rectified. Project Steering Committee is to meet twice a year, independent of other project activities i.e., wrap-up meeting of ADB Mission, to effectively guide and resolve issues on the Project. An updated schedule of covenants is given in Appendix 12.

J. Reallocation of Loan Proceeds

The Mission and the EA reviewed in detail the expenditures incurred under the Project to date, as well as proposed future expenditures, and recognizes the need to reallocate several loan categories. Appendix 13 shows the details of the proposed reallocation and total project

requirement until the end of the Project. Specifically, the following reallocations need to be done for the following:

(i) procurement of research and laboratory equipment for two additional research institutes, Agriculture Environment Institute and Agriculture Science Institute of Northern Central Viet Nam amounting to \$0.38 million and \$0.35 million, respectively.

(ii) revision of curriculum for the 10 vocational and technical training schools

amounting to \$0.60 million.

(iii) increase in contract amount of packages due to adjustment in the value added tax.

(iv) Increase in consultant category for additional consultants inputs as proposed in para. 46.

57. The necessary internal ADB approvals will be processed for the agreed reallocation upon return of the Mission to ADB Manila.

K. Loan Extension

- 58. The Government wishes to complete the Project as designed in terms of outputs and outcomes. Due to 1.5 years delay in the start-up activities and weak capacity of the implementing agencies, it has requested a 1-year extension of the loan and project implementation period to allow: (i) more time for transferring research results into the extension so that the project's impact could be maximized; (ii) some Ph.D candidates to complete their studies before the proposed loan closing date of 30 June 2013; (iii) more time for preparation of about 30 training programs and curriculum revision. It was agreed that this extension will be the only extension of the Project.
- 59. CPMU will acquire letter of assurance from PPMU on counterpart funds and budget support for PPMU staff for the 1-year extension. Given this justification, and the current physical progress of 43%, the Government requested the Mission's endorsement of a 1-year extension, to 30 December 2012 to complete project activities, and to 30 June 2013 for closure of the Loan. Based on its review on the Project's achievements to date and the proposals for completion, the Mission supports this request. The Mission requested the EA to forward a formal request through SBV for loan extension to ADB on behalf of the Government by 1 August 2010.

IV. FOLLOW UP ACTIVITIES

60. A summary of major issues and agreed action plan is shown below.
